



DeVry University COVID-19 Return-to-Onsite Plan

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Introduction

Objective

The DeVry University (DVU) COVID-19 Return-to-Onsite Plan provides Students and visitors with information about how DVU will return to onsite operations.

The Plan is focused on providing the DVU COVID-19 requirements for onsite operations and supplements those requirements with links to resources from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) in each section to provide readers with additional guidance and recommendations.

As all adults are now eligible for and have access to the COVID-19 vaccine, and COVID-19 case rates and hospitalizations have stabilized, DVU is planning to reopen all of our campuses and locations effective October 25, 2021, at which time DVU will enter Phase 2 of our Return-to-Onsite Plan. During Phase 2, all campuses and offices will reopen and certain Colleagues will return to onsite work. As the situation is fluid and may change, DVU will reassess its plans as appropriate to determine the safest way to bring Students and Visitors onsite.

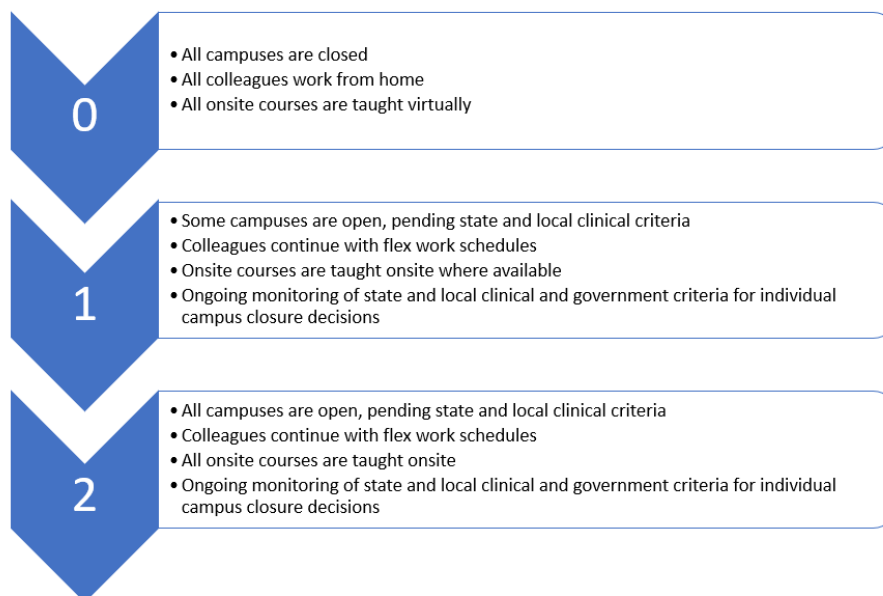
This Plan leverages the CDC guidelines for Higher Education as a starting point (<https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/community/colleges-universities/considerations.html>). The objective is to meet or exceed the CDC guidelines and local public health and safety requirements to ensure the safety and health of DVU Colleagues, Students, visitors, and third parties.

Audience

This Reopening Plan is intended for use by Students and visitors.

Phase Definitions

There are three phases of the Return-to-Onsite plan for campus locations*:



Decision Tree for Moving between Phases

As the COVID-19 situation is fluid, establishing a decision process enabling movement forward and backward through the phases is critical. In summary, the DVU decision tree for the Executive Committee and COVID-19 Taskforce includes three components:

- Evaluate “showstopper” criteria
 - Government (State, Local) and/or clinical criteria
- Evaluate other decision factors & recommendations
 - i.e. Location readiness
- Decide, Deploy & Monitor

Who Should Return Onsite

Beginning October 25, 2021, Students who have enrolled in an onsite course section will be expected to return for class. Students still have the opportunity, as needed, to continue taking online coursework. Student questions related to course schedules should be discussed with their Student Support Advisor.

For those Students returning onsite, DVU is confident based on the guidance from the CDC, OSHA, the applicable local orders, and local public health departments that it has taken the appropriate steps in returning Students safely to class. If you have questions or concerns about returning to class, need any reasonable accommodations, or if there are barriers to your return, contact your Student Support Advisor.

Department of Veteran’s Affairs (VA) Education Benefits (VA Students

Currently, VA students are permitted to be certified as an onsite student for any courses that were converted to virtual instruction due to COVID-19. This allowed those VA students who were eligible to receive a basic allowance for housing (BAH) the ability to receive it as an onsite or in-residence student. As DeVry re-opens its locations in Fall 2021, onsite courses will no longer be converted to virtual instruction. VA students who are registered for onsite courses will be expected to return onsite for class.

International (F-1) students

Currently, International students on F-1 visa status are permitted to take all their classes 100% online or virtually. As DeVry returns to onsite operations, F-1 students must return to in-person instruction. For the 2021/2022 academic school year, both graduate and undergraduate students must take **at least one 3 credit hour onsite course per semester**. For the Fall 2021 and Spring 2022 semesters, students can enroll in an onsite course for one session and be 100% online in the other session. **Students must be physically present for all onsite courses**. Below are options for students to follow:

Undergraduate Students

- Fall 2021: Must enroll in at least 12 credit hours with at least one onsite course for the semester.

- Spring 2022: Must enroll in at least 12 credit hours with at least one onsite course for the semester.
- Summer 2022: Must enroll in at least 12 credit hours for the semester with enrollment in no fewer than 9 credit hours onsite. F-1 students must also enroll in at least one onsite course each 8-week session.

Graduate Students

- Fall 2021: Must enroll in at least 6 credit hours with at least one onsite course for the semester.
- Spring 2022: Must enroll in at least 6 credit hours with at least one onsite course for the semester.
- Summer 2022: Must enroll in at least 6 credit hours for the semester with at least one onsite course in each 8-week session.

F-1 Students Taking Online Classes Outside the United States

Students who departed the U.S. to continue taking their classes online due to the COVID-19 pandemic, may continue to do so for the 2021/2022 academic school year. However, in order to be able to apply for Optional Practical Training (OPT), or continue to use the same Form I-20 after completing their program, these students must return to the U.S. no more than 30 days from their last session start date leading to their program end date. If a student completes their degree program while outside the U.S., the Form I-20 becomes invalid, and that student will need a new Initial Form I-20 to re-enter the U.S.

Note: check the program end date listed on the Form I-20 periodically to ensure that you timely request a program extension before it expires, if needed.

COVID-19 Vaccine Policy

All students and visitors must be fully vaccinated for COVID-19 to stay healthy and help reach herd immunity. Our goal is to protect Colleagues, Students, visitors, business partners, and external stakeholders and the broader community from COVID-19 infection.

DeVry University is accepting any COVID-19 vaccine authorized for emergency use by the FDA – Moderna, Pfizer, and Johnson & Johnson, or any vaccine listed for emergency use by the World Health Organization (<https://extranet.who.int/pqweb/vaccines/covid-19-vaccines>). **To Find a COVID-19 Vaccine**: Search vaccines.gov, text your ZIP code to 438829, or call 1-800-232-0233 to find locations near you.

Students and visitors will be required to complete the COVID-19 Vaccine Attestation Form in order to attest to their vaccination status and return onsite. All students who are registered for an onsite course

will receive a communication regarding the process to provide the attestation. Students may be required to provide documentation confirming their reported vaccination status, in accordance with state requirements.¹

Although we have determined that all students who will be on campus must be vaccinated, we recognize the need for exemptions in some circumstances. Consistent with existing practice, DeVU will engage in an interactive process to determine if a reasonable accommodation can be provided to a student so long as it does not create an undue hardship for the University/or does not pose a direct threat to the health or safety of the Students, Faculty or others on campus. If you are unable or unwilling to receive the COVID-19 vaccine and believe you qualify for an exemption² (disability, medical, or religious), please email the following to discuss reasonable accommodations - ADA@devry.edu. Reasonable accommodations are not guaranteed.

Students with an exemption or accommodation who have been authorized to enter a DeVry facility must have evidence of a negative COVID test once every 7 days prior to entering a DeVry facility. Mask Requirements

Upon request, DeVU will provide disposable masks for use by all persons in DeVU premises at the rate of 2 masks/person/day with at least 30-day supply on hand.

All Students and Visitors

In order to protect the health and safety of our Colleagues, Students, visitors, business partners, and external stakeholders must consistently and correctly wear a two-layer mask covering the nose and mouth while onsite as follows:

- **Indoors.** Students or visitors must wear a mask, including children. Children under 2 are not required to wear a mask.
- **Outdoors.** In general, people do not need to wear masks when outdoors. However, in crowded outdoor settings or during activities that involve sustained close contact with other people who are not fully vaccinated.

DeVU may make exceptions to these mask requirements for the following categories of people:

- A Student with a disability who cannot wear a mask, or cannot safely wear a mask, because of a disability.

¹ The state of Illinois requires higher education personnel and students to provide proof of full vaccination against COVID-19 to the institution of higher education.

² In Texas, DeVU will also consider request for accommodation from any student for any stated objection for any reason of conscience.

Students should submit any request for an accommodation from the mask policy to ada@devry.edu.

Mask requirements may vary by location due to local city, county, state ordinances or mandates. The University or the local location Incident Commander will notify students of changes if applicable.

CALIFORNIA LOCATIONS: The following additional requirements/protocols are in place at our California locations:

- DVU will make available to students training, including on matters related to vaccinations, respirator availability/use/effectiveness, when masks must be used, etc.

Additional Onsite Protocols and Requirements

Location Preparedness

Location Incident Commanders will serve as COVID-19 protocol workplace coordinators. They will be responsible for providing masks upon request, communicating, and facilitating any local or landlord requirements, and coordinating any contact tracing or testing requirements.

To the extent local landlord/building requirements are more restrictive or specific than DVU requirements, the DVU Location Incident Commander will notify Students of these requirements. Notifications will be provided to students and colleagues via email. Signage will also be posted at campus entrances.

Health Screening

All onsite Students (regardless of vaccination status) must self-monitor for COVID-19 symptoms and should stay home if exhibiting any flu-like symptoms. We encourage all Students to rest and stay home when ill and not expose others.

Colleagues, students, and others will be told not to come onsite if they have COVID-19 symptoms, have been diagnosed with COVID-19, have had close contact with someone with COVID-19, or meet other criteria.

Students, regardless of vaccination status, who have COVID-19 symptoms or have had close contact with someone with COVID-19 must report such information to the Incident Commander and should get tested for COVID-19 and remain at home, as described below. Physical Distancing

The CDC recommends continuing to practice physical distancing from others who are not from the same household in both indoor and outdoor spaces, where possible.

Hand Hygiene and Respiratory Etiquette

DVU encourages health-promoting behaviors such as [hand washing](#) and [respiratory etiquette](#) to reduce the spread of infectious illnesses including COVID-19.

Protocol	Description
Hand Washing	All persons in DVU space should wash hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after you have been in a public place, or after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing
Hand Sanitizer	If soap and water are not readily available, use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol. Cover all surfaces of your hands and rub them together until they feel dry.

Contact Tracing in Combination with Isolation and Quarantine

Any required contact tracing will be conducted utilizing information from attendance records, badge readers, and/or paper sign-in at the front desk.

What to do if a Student is COVID Positive or Exposed to Someone who is COVID Positive

The *What to do if a Student is Sick or Exposed to Someone who is Sick* sub-category includes requirements like Case Tracking, Quarantining and Cleaning:

Requirement	Requirement Description
Anyone with Confirmed or Suspected COVID-19 will not be permitted onsite	Anyone with confirmed or suspected COVID-19 will be sent home immediately and not permitted to return until certain criteria are met in accordance with CDC and local health guidelines.
COVID-19 Case Tracking	Location Incident Commander will document all Student cases in EthicsPoint application. This information is stored in confidential files with limited access.

COVID-19 Contact Tracing	Upon notification of confirmed or suspected COVID-19 case, Incident Commander will complete Contact Tracing exercise to identify close contacts and/or other individuals that may have been in the potentially exposed group, as required by state or local law.
Informing Relevant Individuals of Potential Exposure	Incident Commander will inform close contacts and/or anyone in a potentially exposed group of their possible exposure to COVID-19 on campus, as required. DVU will maintain confidentiality as required by the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).
Quarantine for Close Contacts	Any Student who is not fully vaccinated and who has had close contact with someone with suspected or confirmed COVID-19 during their infectious period will be sent home and not permitted to return for 14 days after the potential exposure and until certain criteria are met in accordance with CDC and public health guidelines. Also, fully vaccinated individuals who have been close contacts of a COVID-19 case and develop symptoms will be quarantined in line with this guidance. DeVry will provide information about COVID-19 testing.
Cleaning and Disinfecting	<p>If less than 24 hours since the sick or exposed colleague or student has been in the facility, close off any areas used for prolonged periods of time by the sick/exposed person:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> -Wait 24 hours before cleaning and disinfecting to minimize potential exposure for other colleagues or students -If possible, open doors and windows to increase air circulation in these areas <p>If >24 hours since the sick or exposed Colleague or student has been in the facility, additional cleaning and disinfection is not necessary.</p> <p>Follow CDC and local public health guidance on cleaning and disinfecting, to the extent it is more strict or descriptive than this guidance.</p>

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Some sites may have different rules to comply with local public health and safety requirements and requirements regarding return to class. DVU will comply with the policies in this Plan, or the state or local rules, whichever is more stringent.

Testing for COVID-19

Any fully vaccinated Student who experiences symptoms consistent with COVID-19 should isolate themselves from others, be clinically evaluated for COVID-19, and tested for SARS-CoV-2 if indicated. A symptomatic fully vaccinated Student should inform their healthcare provider of their vaccination status at the time of presentation to care. For additional information see your local health department (see appendix A). Any Student or Visitor with a COVID-19 vaccine exemption who experiences symptoms consistent with COVID-19 should isolate themselves from others, be clinically evaluated for COVID-19, and tested for SARS-CoV-2 if indicated. A Student who is not fully vaccinated and who is asymptomatic but has recent known or suspected exposure to COVID-19 may need to be tested and should monitor for symptoms of COVID-19 for 14 days following an exposure and should consult with a healthcare provider.

Travel Policy

Travel

- Students who are not fully vaccinated are encouraged to avoid non-essential travel to areas of risk in accordance with CDC guidance: <https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/travelers/map-and-travel-notice.html#travel-1>
- Students are encouraged to familiarize themselves with the CDC's guidance regarding travel: <https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/travelers/index.html>.
- Certain state and local orders may require travelers conducting personal travel from certain areas with high rates of community spread to self-quarantine when entering the country or state. Students who are not fully vaccinated may be required to self-quarantine before returning to a DVU location in accordance with CDC and local public health guidance.

International (F-1) Students

Travel from the United States

Students must notify their Designated School Official prior to any planned travel outside of the country, and prior to returning to a DVU location.

Travel to the United States

The Department of State (DOS) and Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) have mandated all air passengers two years of age or older (both foreign and U.S. citizens) arriving to

the U.S. to provide proof of a negative COVID-19 test or proof of recovery from COVID-19 before boarding. Because of the changing array of travel restrictions, Students should refer to their local U.S. embassy's website through the U.S. Department of State for any updates about visa issuance. Also, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and CDC websites provide information about current travel restrictions to the United States.

California COVID-19 Privacy Notice

This Privacy Notice for California ("Notice") applies solely to all individuals that reside in the State of California who are current or prospective students. We are providing this notice to comply with the California Consumer Privacy Act of 2018 ("CCPA") and any terms defined in the CCPA have the same meaning when used in this notice.

Information We Collect

As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, the University is committed to the safety of our Colleagues, Students, business partners and external stakeholders ("Covered Individuals"). As part of this commitment, we need to be aware of the potential risks to our Colleagues and Students should they be present in our facilities. To this end, the University will need to collect certain physiological information that identifies, relates to, is capable of being associated with, or could reasonably be linked, directly or indirectly, with a particular student ("Personal Information"). In particular, we are collecting easily observable physiological information from anyone who enters our facilities or may disclose such information to the University. As such, the University will be collecting the following information:

Categories of Personal Information which are collected
Identifiers and demographic data. This includes name, address, email, etc.
Sensitive data. This includes medical data, biometric data, and physiological data.
Biometric information. This includes easily observable physiological information related to COVID-19 symptoms or COVID-19 symptoms as defined by the CDC which Covered Individuals may disclose to the University.
Inferences based on Personal Information. This is our determination of a Covered Individual's potential risk of infection by the COVID-19 virus based on our observation of physiological information or reporting by the Covered Individual. It is not a determination of whether or not the Covered Individual actually has the virus.

The University generally obtains the categories of Personal Information listed above directly from the Covered Individual.

Use of Personal Information

We may process the Personal Information we collect for the purpose of managing the COVID-19 risks to our Colleagues, Students, business partners and external stakeholders, and the population generally. We may disclose the Personal Information as necessary to those mentioned above, and the population generally who may have been exposed to COVID-19, and/or who may need the information to prevent COVID-19 infection, or as recommended under guidance from the CDC or any other applicable governmental authority. Any such disclosure would be on a no-names basis unless otherwise required. We may also process or disclose the Personal Information where required by law, regulation, court order, or administrative order to do so.
